## Chairman's Message

A big THANK YOU to all who attended the grand opening and dedication of our new Fire Stations in Richboro and Holland! The community turnout was impressive and the event exemplifies your Board of Supervisors' efforts to enhance public safety in our Township. We have been working for over a decade to address the critical shortage of volunteer firefighters in Northampton. The lack of volunteer firefighters is a national crisis, and we were not immune to this challenge.

Deputy Chief Harvey Boyer of the State Fire Commissioner's Office said it best during the ceremony when he stated, "By having paid career firefighters, you're saving the time of dispatch and getting to the fire faster. It's going to make a tremendous difference in this community".

Tri-Hampton Rescue Squad Chief Jason Dowd reported a 30% decrease in response time for ambulance service in the Holland section of the Township by having a dedicated paramedic unit in Station 73. The Fire Department is also reporting significant improvements in response time. **Fire trucks and ambulances are getting to your emergency faster.** 

In addition, the Board of Supervisors has authorized the Administration to increase the number of police officers on our force to enhance public safety, including a dedicated School Resource Officer at Holland Middle School. We now have two dedicated police officers working in our schools to better protect our children.

We are very proud of our first responders, including our police officers, firefighters, and emergency medical services personnel who keep us safe every day.

Finally, we look forward to the sixth year in a row of resurfacing 10 miles of our 182-mile township road system, and thank the men and women of our Public Works Department for the superb job they do each year.

On behalf of the Board of Supervisors, I want to wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving, and a safe and joyful holiday season. See you in 2025!

## FROM THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT...

## Water Heater Replacement

A permit is required for the replacement of water heaters, which must be installed by a registered plumbing contractor. Although many people think that they are a simple piece of equipment, they can be dangerous if installed improperly. In conjunction with the plumbing code, the manufacturer's installation instructions must be used for a safe and efficient installation.

Items to be made aware of include the following:

- A pressure-temperature relief valve with discharge piping of 3/4" minimum is required. The discharge pipe must terminate in a safe
  and visible place, not terminate directly to the outdoors. A shut-off valve on the cold side to the water heater is recommended to be
  replaced and be a full port type valve.
- If the unit is oil or gas fired, combustion air must be adequate for efficient use. The vent or flue connector pipe is required to be screwed together at all joints and have the proper clearances to combustibles. An emergency shut-off switch should be installed at the top of the basement stairs or away from the water heater. Oil-fired water heaters connected to a common flue connector with the oil-fired furnace must have a relay that allows only one appliance to be running at a time.
- If installed above the floor level or above another floor, water heaters must have a safety pan with a drain pipe terminating to a safe dispersal area that can be readily seen.
- An expansion tank is required to be installed on the cold inlet side.

As you can see, water heaters appear to be a simple piece of equipment, but must be installed properly to ensure your safety. If you have any questions, feel free to call the Building Department at 215-355-3883.

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

#### **Cold Weather Fire Safety**

As we move through the cold days and colder nights of the winter months many residents utilize wood stoves or fireplaces. In addition to inspecting and cleaning your chimney annually, ash disposal from these operations must be done safely. Fireplace and stove ashes can remain hot for two weeks or more. Ashes should be stored in a covered metal container outside your home away from the house. Never ever store them inside your house or garage, or in a container next to your home!

Space heaters need space and proper electric supply. If you use an electric space heater plug it into a properly sized electrical receptacle. Avoid the use of extension cords unless properly sized to handle the heater. Never use multitap or power strips for these units. Maintain adequate clearance from your heater to combustibles as specified in the manufactures instructions. Frozen pipes are a pain, and inconvenient at the least. Never thaw your pipes with a torch, as this can lead to a fire. Hairdryers can be utilized with caution; however, it is best to slowly thaw a frozen pipe with warm air. ## **Cold Weather Fire Safety**

The NTFD would like to remind our residents heating, cooking, decorations and candles all contribute to an increased risk of fire in your home during the holiday season and winter months. It's not too early to prepare. The following 10 tips provided by the National Fire Protection Association will help you be better prepared.

- Our furnace has been inspected and serviced by a qualified professional during the last 12 months. (A furnace should be serviced at least once a year.)
- Our **chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected** by a qualified professional. I have checked for creosote built-up. (Not cleaning your chimney is the leading cause of chimney fires from built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least once a year.)
- Our wood for our fireplace or wood stove is dry, seasoned wood.
- Our fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass, in good condition and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.
- We have a **covered metal container** ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. (The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.)
- Our children know to stay at least **3 feet away** from the fireplace, wood/pellet stove, oil stove or other space heaters.
- Our portable space heaters have an automatic shut-off.
- Our portable space heaters will be plugged directly into an outlet (not an extension cord) and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls, and even people. (Place notes throughout your home to remind you to turn off portable heaters when you leave a room or go to bed.)
- We have tested our smoke alarms and made sure they are working. (You need smoke alarms on every level of the home, inside each sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.)
- We have **tested our carbon monoxide alarms** and made sure they are working. (Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.)

#### **DOWNSPOUTS & SUMP PUMP COMPLIANCE**

Stormwater is improperly entering our sanitary sewer system due to connected downspouts and sump pumps. To address this, Northampton Township passed Ordinance No. 492, prohibiting such connections and imposing fines of up to \$1,000 per day for violations. Ensure your sump pump and downspouts drain into the storm sewer or onto your lawn to avoid penalties. If you're unsure about compliance, seek assistance immediately.



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

Plan also includes Basketball Court and Hockey Rink Restoration





#### On this day, in history...

November 15, 1763: Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon began surveying the line between Pennsylvania and Maryland, now known as the Mason-Dixon line.

December 12, 1787: Pennsylvania becomes the second state to ratify the U.S. Constitution.

December 14, 1722: Bucks County approved the petition submitted by local landowners to establish Northampton as a township.

December 15, 1791: The first U.S. law school was established at the University of Pennsylvania.

January 1, 1781: 1,500 soldiers of the 6th Pennsylvania Regiment under General Anthony Wayne, rebel against the Continental Army's winter camp in Morristown, New Jersey as part of the Pennsylvania Mutiny of 1781.

February 15, 1799: The first U.S. printed ballots were authorized in Pennsylvania for the state's elections. Previously, votes were documented through vocal voting or public ballots where voters would place their name below a candidate's.

## A MESSAGE FROM PUBLIC WORKS

#### **WINTER SNOW REMOVAL REMINDERS:**

Our goal at the Public Works Department during the winter season is to make all Township-owned roads safe and accessible to the public. The cooperation and assistance of our residents is key to an effective winter storm operation. Due to many variables that are inherent in Pennsylvania weather, each storm and/or weather event may require slightly different efforts and/or emphasis on any number of maintenance tasks, which together, determine the overall winter maintenance, snow removal, or ice control strategy.

- Shoveling snow to the right-hand side of your driveway will reduce the amount of snow pushed back into your driveway by a plow. It is recommended, if possible, that homeowners shovel after the Township has plowed their road.
- Mailboxes are rarely hit by plows, but may be damaged by the weight of the plowed snow. We ask that homeowners ensure that
  their mailboxes are firmly attached to the post and that the post is sturdy enough to withstand the weight of the plowed snow.
  Residents should also be sure that the mailbox area is clear for mail delivery.
- If you believe that your street was missed during a snow clearing effort, call (215) 355-3433.

#### **PUBLIC WORKS FAQs:**

#### How do I report pot holes for patching?

For Township Roads, please call (215) 355-3433 to report pot hole location.

For any problem on the **State Highways**, please call **PennDOT** at 215-345-6060, or **Submit a Concern on their website:** www.penndot.gov

#### Who do I contact to remove dead deer?

We are no longer allowed to pick up dead deer. Please call the Police Non-Emergency # (215) 357-8700 and they will refer the request to the PA Game Commission or PennDOT.

#### Will you remove a tree that fell and is blocking the road?

If the tree belongs to the homeowner, we will clear the roadway and place the tree limbs, debris, etc. on the homeowner's property. The homeowner is responsible for contacting a landscaper to remove the tree debris from their property.

#### What is the mowing schedule for the Township basins?

We try to mow the 85 basins, 16 traffic islands, and the clear sight triangles on a 2 to 3-week turnaround schedule, however sometimes it is delayed due to the weather.

#### How do I report a Street Light that is not working, or a Street Sign that is damaged?

Call (215) 355-3433 with the exact location of the Street Light and the Pole # if applicable (this can be found on the Pole tag).

For damaged Traffic signs call (215) 355-3433 with the exact location of the sign.

#### **Northampton Township Snow Removal Policy**

**OBJECTIVE:** It is the goal and intent of Northampton Township to provide timely, efficient, and cost-effective winter maintenance, snow removal, and ice control on the roadways of the municipality. This objective is assigned to the Public Works Department.

**PROCEDURE:** Due to many variables that are inherent in Pennsylvania weather, each storm and/or weather event may require slightly different efforts and/or emphasis on any number of maintenance tasks, which together, determine the overall winter maintenance, snow removal, or ice control strategy.

**LEVEL OF SERVICE:** It is not possible to maintain snow and ice-free roads during a storm. It is the intention of Northampton Township to provide practical, safe access along city streets during winter storms. The Public Works Department shall plow all **priority** roads first, to provide the basic transportation system for public safety, schools, high volume streets, steep grades, etc. following a snowstorm of 3" or greater. Lower priority streets (inner subdivision streets), will be plowed next, areas that are prone to wind and drifting snow will receive priority. The remaining township streets, dead ends, and cul-de-sacs are plowed last, <u>traffic lanes only</u>. Cul-de-sacs will be plowed 1 pass in and 1 pass out providing no cars are parked in the roadway. All operational decisions regarding pre-salting, scheduling, or equipment operators and private contractors shall be based upon these goals.

It is the policy of Northampton Township, to have the operating crews of the Public Works Department begin snow removal operations upon accumulation of two inches of snowfall. The Supervisor may, after consultation with the Public Works Director, at his/her discretion based upon weather information reports, elect to not remove snow until greater or lesser accumulations occur. During nights and weekends, the Police Department shall notify the Supervisor or his/her on-call designee that road conditions warrant mobilization of snow removal or ice control activity.

HOW SNOW PLOWING WORKS: Northampton has roughly 42 snow plow trucks. Plowing will begin on the main, priority roads (following an accumulation of 3" or greater snowfall), followed by inner subdivision streets. Cul-de-sacs and dead-ends streets are the last priority; however, we will strive to get to them as soon as possible. We will aim to have the main roads cleared within 24 hours of the end of any storm, and the inner subdivision streets, dead-end streets, and cul-de-sacs within 72 hours.

The snowplows are designed to push the snow from the <u>centerline</u> of the road to the edge of the road. This sometimes creates a problem with blocking driveways and mailboxes. <u>Please be aware that it is the resident's responsibility to clear the snow from in front of their driveway and mailbox to ensure mail delivery.</u>

Also, no snow or ice removed from private property shall be deposited in the public ways, and include the following:


- 1. Pushing or carrying and depositing snow or ice on a public right-of-way or sidewalk.
- 2. The blowing of snow or ice into a pedestrian or vehicle travel lane.

#### **PLEASE NOTE:**

It is not the position of Northampton Township to maintain a bare pavement policy or to provide snow and ice removal on every city street during or after every snowstorm. Therefore, after periods in which the movement of traffic has occurred, snowplows are not as effective for totally clearing packed snow or icy roadways, except to remove loose material on top.

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
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
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
