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



YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Chairman's Letter

Dear Northampton Residents,

The Northampton Board of Supervisors has a proven track record of being proactive when it comes to providing emergency management services for the residents of Northampton Township. As prescribed by the Pennsylvania Second Class Code, the Board of Supervisors take very seriously the fundamental responsibility of the Township to provide fire protection services. On April 26, 2017, Pennsylvania Senate Resolution 6 (SR-6) was adopted which established a 39-Member Commission tasked with providing a report on the current state of fire protection and the "... challenges of maintaining the readiness of emergency service organizations." The final report of SR-6 was released in the Fall of 2018 and it indicates that "... the number of volunteer firefighters has shrunk from 300,000 in the 1970's to about 60,000 in the early 2000's to 38,000 in 2018." Recognizing and understanding the changing trends in fire services, and the real impact of fewer volunteers in the ranks to provide comprehensive fire protection, the Northampton Township Board of Supervisors proactively established a combination volunteer-career department in 2009. As highlighted in the following article written by Fire Chief, Adam Selisker, this successful venture now boasts six career firefighters "... that conduct fire safety inspections and provide proactive community fire prevention outreach in addition to fire and medical emergency response." Building on more than 100 years of volunteer services, the Board of Supervisors will continue to support the efforts of all the volunteers and career firefighters.

Your Fire Department is Changing with the Times

Adam M. Selisker- Fire Chief

In 1914 a group of concerned residents got together and formed the Richboro Fire Company #1 (now Northampton Township Volunteer Fire Company). They knew then what we know today; the residents of Northampton Township need a dedicated fire and rescue force.

Over the 100 plus years since that day in 1914, the Northampton Township Volunteer Fire Company has grown to be one of largest and best trained departments in the area with three stations and over 60 first responders. Your volunteer firefighting force remains strong, however it has become more difficult to recruit, train and retain new volunteers. This trend follows a statewide and nationwide shortage of volunteers.

The extensive requirements and training to become a firefighter, along with increase of emergency calls requires our Fire Department to think differently. Many of our volunteers leave the township each day for work and school, drastically reducing the number of available personnel during the day. A new firefighter must complete a minimum of 200 hours of training before responding. That's two weeknights and all day Saturday for over four months!

In 2009, the Township and Fire Department applied for and received a Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant from the federal government. This grant allowed the Township to hire four paid daytime firefighters to supplement the volunteers for times of shortage. This program has been extremely successful. Today we have six career firefighters including a career Deputy Fire

Chief that conduct fire safety inspections and provide proactive community fire prevention outreach in addition to fire and medical emergency response.

The idea of a "combination" volunteer and career fire department is not new. This concept has been used around the country in areas where recruiting volunteers has been difficult.

Your Fire Department along with Northampton Township support will embrace this trend, grow our "combination" status and continue our long tradition of top notch 24/7 fire and rescue services. In fact, we have submitted another SAFER grant application for five more firefighters which will enhance daytime coverage by expanding service hours and including weekends.

The Northampton Township Board of Supervisors and Northampton Township Volunteer Fire Company remain committed to provide appropriate levels of funding and resources to protect our residents and visitors for many years to come.

Nancy Opalka Receives Statewide Award

Northampton Township Parks & Recreation Director, Nancy Opalka, was recognized with the Distinguished Member Award in Honor of Robert D. Griffith by the Pennsylvania Recreation and Park Society at their annual awards banquet on April 4, 2019. Candidates are current professional members, with a minimum of 10 years compensated experience, who have consistently contributed to the advancement of the Society, affiliated organizations or the profession in a variety of ways.

Nancy Opalka, is a deserving recipient of PRPS Distinguished Member Award in Honor of Robert D. Griffith due to the significant, positive impact she has made on the lives of Northampton Township residents for over 30 years. During that time, Nancy has provided outstanding recreation and parks services for thousands of individuals from preschool to 99 years of age. With a total annual parks and recreation budget of \$2.5 million, \$1.5 million of which is generated from user fees and charges that cover 100% of direct recreation program expenses. The success of providing recreation and park opportunities has seen the department grow from two (2) full time employees in 1988 to nine (9) full time, two (2) part time, and one hundred thirty-two (132) seasonal employees. Under Nancy's guidance and leadership, Northampton Township Parks & Recreation Department is considered a core function of local government and is regionally recognized as a park and recreation industry leader that is a model for other municipalities. In addition to programming, Nancy has developed a park system

Are Your Downspouts or Sump Pumps Connected to the Sanitary Sewer System?

OUESTIONS AND ANSWERS REGARDING SEWER SYSTEM CONNECTIONS

0: WHAT IS A DOWNSPOUT?

A: A downspout is a pipe that is connected to the rain gutter of your home. The pipe may be improperly connected to your sanitary sewer service. When it rains or when the snow on your roof melts, the water travels down the gutters into the downspouts and finally into the sanitary sewer main in the street.

Q: WHY IS HAVING YOUR DOWNSPOUTS CONNECTED A PROBLEM?

A: Discharging rain water to a sanitary sewer through downspouts violates state and federal laws required by the Clean Water Act of 1977, and contributes to increased cost of stormwater that the Authority has to unnecessarily convey and treat each year. Stormwater from downspouts greatly contributes to this

increased wastewater flow. Because the Authority system is not designed to handle this amount of flow, the wastewater is not treated properly and adds to the potential of discharging pollutants to the environment.

Q: HOW DO I DISCONNECT MY DOWNSPOUTS?

A: Disconnecting your downspouts is very easy and inexpensive. It can be done by disconnecting your rain gutter from the downspout and then connecting it to a downspout extension. A downspout extension can also provide water to landscaping that would not normally receive rain water due to overhangs. Downspout extensions can be purchased at any hardware or home and garden store.


Q: WHAT HAPPENS IF I DECIDE TO NOT DISCONNECT MY DOWNSPOUTS OR SUMP PUMPS?

A: Pursuant to Northampton Township Ordinance No 492, a violation is punishable by a fine of \$1,000.00 per day.

Q: WHAT IS THE REASON FOR REGULATION?

A: Wastewater is the discharge from toilets, sinks, showers, bathtubs, dishwashers and washing machines. People produce wastewater. It must be treated. Wastewater is removed through the sanitary sewer system. Sanitary sewers carry it to a treatment facility. Groundwater or storm water is water from rain or snow, which seeps into the soil. When soil becomes saturated, ground water seeps into basements. Sump pumps are commonly used to remove this water. Sump pumps must not be connected to sanitary sewers, but rather must be connected to a storm sewer or discharged onto lawns. **Q: WHY?**

A: When sump pumps or downspouts discharge into sanitary sewer, flooding often is the result. Sanitary sewers are not designed to handle the extra volume rain runoff and sump



pumps add. This extra volume overloads the design capacity of the system. Wastewater needs to be treated. Groundwater from sump pumps or downspouts does not. When the volume of wastewater is increased by the addition of groundwater from sump pumps, the Authority's and ultimately the home and business owners' treatment cost increase significantly and unnecessarily. On March 12, 2004, Northampton Township passed Ordinance No. 492, which prohibits sump pumps from being connected to sanitary sewers. A violation is punishable by a fine of \$1,000.00 per day.

0: WHAT SHOULD I DO IF MY SUMP PUMP OR DOWNSPOUTS ARE CONNECTED TO **THE SANITARY SEWER?**

A: Reroute the pipe so that it discharges onto your lawn or into a nearby storm sewer. If you have questions, or need assistance or advice about how to bring your sump pump into compliance with the law, contact the Municipal Authority at 215-357-8515.

Q: IF I ASK FOR HELP, WILL I BE SUBJECT TO THE FINE?


A: No, as long as you take immediate steps to disconnect your sump pump or downspouts from the sanitary sewer. Our main mission is to eliminate those connections.

Q: ARE WE THE ONLY TOWNSHIP HAVING THIS PROBLEM?

A: No. All communities are dealing with the same issues. We are seeking your assistance in promoting environmental responsibility.

CAR CARE AND YOUR WATER: WHAT'S THE CONNECTION?

Your car and how well you maintain it have a significant impact on the lakes and streams near you. Cars carry many different hazardous fluids and require natural resources to run. How efficiently or inefficiently our cars use these resources and carry these fluids has a direct impact on our environment. When a vehicle is poorly maintained, and the maintenance activities are carelessly conducted, chemicals may spill or drip onto the pavement and, eventually, are carried by snow melt or rain into our streams and lakes. A well-maintained vehicle uses less gasoline and runs more efficiently without dripping chemicals onto the pavement or spewing excess exhaust into the air. Follow these simple guidelines to reduce the impact your car has on our streams, lakes and rivers – and save yourself money, too!

CAR WASHING

While washing your car, the water collects soap, detergents, residues from exhaust fumes, gasoline and motor oils. Eventually, the water washes off the car and onto the pavement, collecting additional debris and pollutants before flowing down to the nearest storm drain. Unlike the treated water that comes out of a faucet in your home or at work, water that goes into storm drains flows directly to the lakes and streams near you with everything it has collected along the way!

TIP: Use water friendly soaps!

Many commercial grade soaps contain non-biodegradable detergents and acids. If you wash your car at home, try buying soaps that are labeled "non-toxic", "phosphate-free", or "biodegradable". The safest products for the environment are vegetable-based or citrus-based soaps.

TIP: Prevent the water from reaching the storm drain!

Minimize the amount of water running into a storm drain by washing your car on the lawn instead of the driveway. This will not only give your lawn a watering, but the grass and soil will naturally filter out some of the harmful chemicals or fluids. Remember, whenever possible, shut off the hose to prevent wasting water.

CAR FLUIDS

Vehicle fluids include any fluid normally used during operation, such as engine oil, transmission fluid, power steering fluid, brake fluid, and radiator fluid. When these fluids leak or drip out of the car onto the pavement or are improperly disposed, even in small amounts, they eventually run off into storm drains, lakes, and streams where they can contaminate water supplies and kill fish and other aquatic life. In some cases, if a drinking water supply is contaminated, it can be costly to correct and poses a health risk to humans. The cost to treat this contaminated water is passed onto consumers. If your drinking water is supplied by a well, the possibility of contamination may even be greater. Proper vehicle maintenance and good housekeeping when conducting vehicle maintenance activities can help protect your water resources and your wallet, too.




TIP: Check for leaks!

Have your vehicle checked for leaks at least once every three months. If you change your own oil, be sure to dispose of the used motor oil at an oil recycling center and not on the ground or down a storm drain. Many facilities that sell and change oil will accept your used oil, including quick lubes, Wal-Mart and Murray's Auto Center. Call your local businesses to find the most convenient place for you to dispose of your used fluids properly.

TIP: Clean up spills!

It is always a good idea to use an oil pan when working on your vehicle to prevent accidental spills. If you do spill, pour cat litter, sawdust, or cornmeal to absorb the spilled materials. Let this dry for a few hours and then sweep up the absorbents. If the spill is less than one gallon, place the absorption grains in a heavy-duty garbage bag and dispose with your trash. Otherwise, take the material to your local household hazardous waste drop-off site.

PLANNING AND ZONING CORNER...

The following is multi-part series on the planning and zoning process. In each issue, we will focus on a particular area in order to better help you understand the documents, process, and terms that guide planning and zoning in Northampton Township. This month we will focus on the **Northampton Township Zoning Hearing Board**.

What is the Zoning Hearing Board?

As discussed in our last edition, the Zoning Map identifies the zoning designation of each property in Northampton Township. In addition, the Zoning Ordinance outlines setbacks, minimum lot areas, lot coverage requirements, permitted uses, parking requirements, and other criteria.

Suppose as a property owner, for example, you are proposing an addition with a fifteen (15) foot side yard setback instead of the required twenty (20) feet. (Please Note: Twenty (20) feet is an example for this scenario. Each district has a different setback requirement). Since the Zoning Ordinance requirements are not being met, a permit cannot be approved. A variance, however, can be sought from the Zoning Hearing Board. In general, the following is an overview of the key points regarding the process.

- Northampton Township's Zoning Hearing Board consists of three members who are appointed by the Board of Supervisors. The Zoning Hearing Board, however, is a quasijudicial body that operates independently and is represented by their own Solicitor.
- The operation of the Zoning Hearing Board is outlined in the Municipalities Planning Code (MPC), which is the State legislation that dictates zoning and planning in Pennsylvania.
- When an application is filed, the Zoning Hearing Board is required to hold a hearing within sixty (60) days.
- Neighboring property owners are notified, the property is posted that a hearing will take place, and an advertisement is placed in the newspaper.
- A court reporter is present at all hearings to have a record of everything that is stated at each hearing.
- When the Zoning Hearing Board makes a decision on an appeal, a Decision and Order is issued within forty-five (45) days.

This information is a summary of the Zoning Hearing Board. There are many more technical aspects regarding the process and legalities with respect to the granting of a variance.

The Northampton Township Office of the Fire Marshal in Conjunction with NFPA Offers you the following fire safety tips.

Gasoline & propane safety

The leading equipment involved in LP-gas home structure fires is a grill, hibachi, or barbecue.

Propane safety tips

- Handle any propane-powered equipment cautiously and always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Cylinder tanks for equipment such as stoves and ovens must be located outside of the home.
- Never store or use propane gas cylinders larger than one pound inside the home.
- Never operate a propane-powered gas grill inside the home.
- Have propane gas equipment inspected periodically by a professional for possible leaks or malfunctioning parts.
- Carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions when lighting a pilot.
- If you smell a strong odor of gas, leave the area immediately and call the fire department from outside the home.

Gasoline safety tips

- Keep gasoline out of children's sight and reach. Children should never handle gasoline.
- If a fire does start while handling gasoline, do not attempt to extinguish the fire or stop the flow of gasoline. Leave the area immediately, and call for help.
- Do not use or store gasoline near possible ignition sources (i.e., electrical devices, oil- or gas-fired appliances, or any other device that contains a pilot flame or a spark).
- Store gasoline outside the home (i.e., in a garage or lawn shed) in a tightly closed metal or plastic container approved by an independent testing laboratory or the local or state fire authorities. Never store gasoline in glass containers or non-reusable plastic containers (i.e., milk jugs).
- Store only enough gasoline necessary to power equipment and let machinery cool before refueling it.
- Never use gasoline inside the home or as a cleaning agent.
- Clean up spills promptly and discard clean-up materials properly.
- Do not smoke when handling gasoline.
- Never use gasoline in place of kerosene.



Northampton Township - A Decade of Change

Northampton Township has been described by some as the quintessential bedroom community. Our family moved here in 1951, and we lived on 2 acres surrounded by farms. We often had to wait for use of the telephone because it was still a party line system. We did not have a separate number until the Elmwood exchange started in 1953. These memories were triggered by the current construction of a new and larger police department headquarters. The current police building sits across from the Northampton Administration building and is almost 45 years old.

The township is unique among municipalities in not only having all emergency and administrative functions in the same complex, but also in separate buildings. The Tax Collector and Municipal Authority did relocate last year a short distance away. But the rest of the township agencies sit on the 10 acres purchased in 1962. And a small parcel added in 1985 for the library. Many township residents are not aware that prior to the current situation most operations for Northampton Township were centered in a building located on Second Street in Richboro next to the Spread Eagle Inn.

At the end of the Second World War, Northampton Township existed as it had for over 200 years - a community centered on its many farms. Local government concerns were primarily focused on maintaining local roads often with farmers handling the roads in lieu of taxes. The police and fire departments were composed of volunteers. Stores for consumer goods were minimal in size, places of worship limited to one in Richboro, and sources of entertainment unchanged from bygone years.

Northampton Township did not even have any zoning laws until 1948, allowing one to build unencumbered except for staying off your neighbor's property. With increased mechanization, gone were the days of large masonry houses and cheap labor provided by having large families. Even though the township population did decrease slightly according to the 1930 census, there was some growth in housing between the two World Wars. During this period building of new houses was primarily stick-frame construction. Sears Roebuck & Co. did sell pre-fabricated houses in the 1930's, and there are a number in the Township, especially Cornell Avenue in Churchville.

There had been some small roads added to the Township during this period and the Pa. Dept. of Highways did pave many of the major roads, but everyone lived without a street address. Our family lived 3/4 mile outside of Richboro and had only a Post Office as an address until the late1950's. Visitors were told to travel the approximate distance and look for our house described to them by my parents.

This changed in 1949 with the construction of the first "development" north of Richboro. Now for the first time one lived in "Casey Track" as the new section was called by its developer. No longer did one live in or near one of the three towns - Holland, Richboro, Churchville or have a Rural Delivery address Ivyland, Newtown, and Langhorne to live in Northampton.

It did not matter if the houses built were a split-level, colonial, rancher, etc. The population growth in Northampton for almost 30 years was new housing R-2 developments with 1/2 acre lots. These early sections prior to the existence of the Municipal Authority had septic systems and wells for water. In 1955 the Township passed a



new ordinance changing the specifications for R-2 developments so new roads were widened to 31 feet and they had concrete curbing. It is interesting to drive throughout the Township and identify those sections preceding this date by their road design.

Many of the new families moving into the township during the 1950's were WWII vets often educated by the GI Bill and a traditional stay-at-home mother. The surrounding business community was slow in adapting to the burgeoning population. The first small shopping center was built circa 1957, but the larger food stores did not arrive until the late 1960's. With many households only having one car and fathers commuting for employment, necessary food items were provided by home delivery--milk from Gardenville Dairies, bread from Freihofer Bakery, and ice cream from O'Boyles in Bristol. We even had the occasional visit from the Fuller Brush Man.

Most people then as now moved to Northampton for its openness and "bucolic" setting. Achieving this with some of the new higher density housing was difficult, but most preserve some "open space" as a green buffer. In the 1950's and early 1960's there were no public parks, but the 1/2 acre lots provided the elbow room. The Township felt more open partially because there were fewer trees blocking your view. Farmers tilled every acre possible unless limited by poor drainage or steep grades. I can still remember the shock when a survey taken in the late 1970's indicated most students felt they lived in Suburbia while we still had farms adjacent to our property.

My experiences were shaped by the 1950's and perhaps my glasses have become rose-colored. But I admire the men (sorry, women were not involved in politics at this time) who witnessed a growing community and took steps to guide its future. They brought a new degree of professionalism to a job as Township Supervisor now as then mostly volunteer and unappreciated. They utilized local laws (ordinances) at first allowed under the Second Class Township Code, produced the first Comprehensive Plan in 1962 guiding future growth, and finally established a full-time police department in 1965. Hopefully, reader interest and personal time will allow me to examine the individual departments of the township in greater detail during this period of growth and change in Northampton.





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


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
